WHEREAS, the FFA promotes premier leadership, personal growth and career success among its members; and


WHEREAS, agricultural education and the FFA ensure a steady supply of young professionals to meet the growing demands in the science, business and technology of agriculture; and

Commissioner Woodson moved to approve Item 7.B.2., seconded by Commissioner Fox, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

7.B.3. Consideration of approval of a replacement for Joe McCurry who recently resigned from the EMS Board
(Recommended unanimously by the Rules & Legislative Committee; Deferred from Dec. Co. Commission meeting)

County Mayor Ray appointed Brad Vincent. Commissioner Vincent moved to accept Mayor Ray's appointment, seconded by Commissioner Yockey, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

7.B.4. Consideration of approval of a rezoning request from Roger Smith from A-1 to C-2 at 3225 Hwy. 231 North; Tax Map 040, Parcel 025.00 (Tract 1, consisting of 7.6 acres), for the Purpose of auto sales.
(Recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission & Rules & Legislative Committee)

Commissioner Smith moved to approve Item 7.B.4., seconded by Commissioner Brothers. Upon question from Commissioner Vannatta, Mr. Smith stated this request would in no way interfere with Commissioner Vannatta's irrigation rights. Motion to approve then passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

7.B.5. Consideration of approval of amending the Zoning Resolutions to allow stand-alone Accessory structure.
(Recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission & Rules & Legislative Committee)

Commissioner Yockey moved to approve Item 7.B.5., seconded by Commissioner Smith, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

7.B.6. Consideration of approval of adopting the 2009 International Building Code and 2009 Residential Code which includes amending out the required sprinkler system for one and two family dwellings.
(Recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission & Rules & Legislative Committee)

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve Item 7.B.6., seconded by Commissioner Smith. Commissioner Wilson asked how this would change anything relative to what is currently in place. Codes Director Demonbren came forward to state the only major change was the sprinkler system which, if passed tonight would be amended out. Minor changes would be requiring carbon monoxide alarms instead of smoke alarms, requiring limited opening devices on windows and locking caps on HVAC units. Upon question from Commissioner Yockey, Director Demonbren stated if the 2009 Codes aren't adopted the state will impose their own minimum building codes. She said all features in the Building codes are for safety. Commissioner Smith said the reason for opting out of the sprinkler system was because the county does not have sufficient water pressure in the rural parts of the County to handle this without the homeowner installing pumps and storage facilities which would be costly. Motion to approve Item 7.B.6. then passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

7.B.7. Consideration of amending the Zoning Resolutions to include allowed zoning and definition for "homeless shelter".
(Recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission & Rules & Legislative Committee)

Commissioner Smith moved to approve Item 7.B.7., seconded by Commissioner Yockey. Commissioner Wilson asked where homeless shelters could go. Commissioner Yockey and Director Demonbren stated they could be placed in a C-1 on a main highway such as Highways 231, 41A, 130 and 82. Motion to approve then passed with Commissioner Wilson voting, no.

7.B.8. Consideration of nomination for vacancies on the 6th, 8th, and 9th District Road Board.
(Recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission & Rules & Legislative Committee)

County Mayor Ray stated there was not a recommendation for the 6th District. Andrew Robertson was recommended for the 8th District. Commissioner Vannatta moved to accept the recommendation, seconded by Commissioner Smith, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board. Ronnie Sudberry was recommended for the 9th District. Commissioner Wilson moved to accept the recommendation, seconded by Commissioner Yockey, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

Commissioner Farrar stated he needed clarification on which meetings would be moved to the Medical Arts Building. He stated he was not for moving the meetings from the Courthouse since it was centrally located and convenient for the citizens of the county. County Mayor Ray stated the Committee Meetings would move but the full Commission meetings would remain at the Courthouse unless the courtroom was tied up for trials. Commissioner Vincent stated the Courthouse and Property Committee discussed this for the full Commission Meetings to move locations in an emergency only. Commissioner King asked if the renovation money would come from the rents currently being received by the occupants of the Medical Arts Building, to which Mayor Ray responded, yes. Commissioner King then moved to approve Item 7.C.1., seconded by Commissioner Yockey, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

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D. LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE

(No items were placed on the agenda by the Law Enforcement Committee)

Commissioner Fox moved to suspend the rules. Motion to suspend passed by unanimously vote on a show of hands.

Commissioner Fox asked to bring the Sheriff's salary up to the normal Sheriff's pay effective January 2010. Commissioner Wilson moved to allow this, seconded by Commissioner Vincent, and passed on a roll call vote by unanimous vote of the Board.

14 ayes - 0 noes

County Attorney Bobo stated that the County has certain reporting requirements after the Public Hearing on Item D. He then proposed the following motion. "There being no concerns or complaints voiced by the public at the Public Hearing conducted concerning the Judicial Commissioner's System, I move that the body conclude that the system is functioning properly and that notice to this effect be given to the judges and judiciary committees as set forth in TCA 40-1-111(a)(2)(B)." Commissioner Barrett then stated this as his motion for approval, seconded by Commissioner Smith, and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

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8. QUARTERLY REPORTS (Activity report, no financial)

A. County Mayor

County Mayor Ray stated new procedures were making county government more efficient. Sales tax collections are down and money is tight. Other counties across the state are experiencing cutbacks and lay-offs. A transit company is going to be coming to Bedford County and making trips to Murfreesboro and Nashville for \$25.00. We are looking at a plant expansion with 1000 jobs by summer if things work out. Another plant has taken some options which would mean 25 new jobs if they come here. Certificates of Deposits have been bid out. The county has an Investment Committee made up of bank presidents, with Commissioner Wilson being the Chairman.

8. Con't:

B. Animal Control Director

Director Gregory said the Rescue Wagon program is continuing. A grant was received through them and was used to put down a floor and enclose the carport being used for overflow. They have purchased a livestock trailer with funds they already had.

C. Zoning Director

Director Demonbren said permits were up in November but back down in December due to the weather. Both Dollar General Stores are underway and on schedule. No property owners have been turned over to the delinquent tax attorney.

D. Property Assessor

Assessor Clanton said over 1500 personal property tax schedules have been sent out and are due back March 1st. Upon question from Commissioner Wilson, she stated they were sent regular mail. There has been 151 sales and of those 86 sold above appraisal. Reappraisals will be starting around June and will be complete January 1, 2011. The GIS Orthos will be provided to counties free of charge and TDOT will handle the flyovers.

E. IT

Director Trott said EMS had some security issues with their upgrades that had been taken care of. There have been 20 completed work orders this quarter. Upcoming projects include face book and twitter.

F. EMA

Director Johnson said FEMA has just approved the Counties Mitigation Plan. This gives the County access to compete for grant money. They have been working with the City of Wartrace on cellular projects which include text messaging to residents about train blocking or emergency situations.

G. County Clerk

Clerk Prater said the State took over business tax effective January 1, 2010. There has been some confusion, as expected, but that is being worked through. Business tax auditors had the office recall all of the distress warrants that had been issued when they started the audit. It was assumed these would be collected. They were not collected by audit and the clerk's office is now in the process of reissuing those. The clerk's office is still responsible for delinquencies through 2009. No monies have been received from the State yet, but should be paid over to the clerk and trustee by the 20th of the month.

H. EMS Director

Director Graham said call volume is strong with 2771 calls year to date. They are within their goal of a 4 to 6 minute response time in the city and 12 minutes in the county.

A First Responder program has been started and funded through a highway safety grant.

I. Director of Schools

Superintendent Gray said the Board of Education has completed their part in the Unionville Deason Road project and County Mayor Ray has received the contract. Highway Superintendent Smotherman is now in charge. He thanked Highway Superintendent Smotherman and his department for the job they did during the snow, stating they would have closed schools for 4 or 5 more days if not for the great job they did clearing the roads. They have started a backpack program which allows some students to pick up food for the week-end. They cut their telephone bills by \$2200.00 per month by changing from land lines to voice over IP. They are in the budget process and the Governor has proposed to fund BEP fully next year.

Commissioner Fox asked how Race to the Top was going to affect Bedford County and the teachers. Superintendent Gray said this would change everything about education and he had a prepared 30 minutes presentation that he would be glad to show anyone who was interested. The State will know in April if they have gotten the money and the Education Department will have 60 days to turn in a plan approved by the School Board and the County Commission. The money will be over a 4 year period and will not be spent on on-going programs which would be locked in.

8. Con't:

J. Veterans Service Officer

Officer Warren said Bedford County had 324 veterans in 2008 that the government paid \$2,470,633. In 2009 the figures went to 462 veterans paid \$2,874,000. They made 38 trips to the VA and he saw 141 veterans this last quarter.

K. Election Registrar

Registrar Leverette said the qualifying deadline for the May Primary is 12:00 Noon, February 18, 2010. This includes all county offices, including County Commissioners, except Property Assessor and Highway Superintendent. Anyone running as Independent must still qualify by this deadline.

L. Register of Deeds

Register Reed said at the ending of the 2nd quarter his office had 291 deeds recorded, 85 quit claim deeds, 61 trustee deeds, 24 notices of completions and total recorded documents of 2,048. They have back-indexed 25 books and are getting a bid to have plats scanned into the system.

M. Communication Director

Director Mathis stated they answered 13,445 telephone calls for the quarter and actually dispatched 6,529 of these. They have their backup operation working at EMA in case of a disaster.

N. Highway Superintendent/Solid Waste

Superintendent Smotherman said they are in process of clearing roads and grinding brush due to falling tree limbs during the snow. Once the weather gets dry, they plan on patching potholes. He said the bad weather has taken a toll on Bedford County Roads and that will need to be addressed in the near future. They are going to have to do an environmental awareness study on the land at the Unionville Deason -Highway 41-A interchange.

Solid Waste is still averaging 1000 tons per month. The price of recyclables and scrap metal is coming back up.

Commissioner Wilson noted that a lot of the county roads were eroding on the sides and asked what kind of program needed to be put in place to stop this from happening. Superintendent Smotherman said an overlay of hot mix would hold it for several years. At the present it is costing \$75,000. for a mile of asphalt.

To keep you up-to-date, I am sending the following information for tax collections:

PROPERTY TAX COLLECTIONS: through Feb. 8, 2010:

- Current Year Property Tax – We are ahead of last years total by \$302,063.15.
- Prior Year Property Tax – We are ahead of last years total by \$34,978.25.
- Penalty & Interest - We are ahead of last years total by \$5,269.49.

Although we are doing well so far, we are not out of the woods yet. We will know more about where we stand by the end of February.

SALES TAX COLLECTIONS: through Jan. 31, 2010:

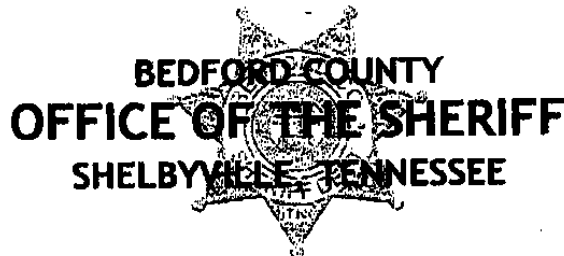
- We are down \$276,592.89 in net collections (Approximately 4.5% less than the same period last year), (Cash Basis).

October, 2009

Miles patrolled for Month of October was 66,328 miles and used 4,592 gallons of fuel at cost of \$9,082.43 which averages out to be 14.44 miles per gallon per car.

There were 1,053 warrants served, 101 reports that were written, and there were 1,433 calls dispatched.

Total number of intakes and releases were 407, 286 for the jail, and 79 for the workhouse 42 for juvenile center.

There were a total of 19,256 meals that served, 10,979 for the jail at a cost of \$.94 per tray, 7,626 for the workhouse at a cost of \$1.76 per tray, and 651 for the juvenile center at a cost of \$.94 per tray. Total cost for all meals served was \$22,405.44.

We had 11 transports this month, 6 inmate transports to and from other counties and (2) transports to Parthenon in Nashville, (1) to Vanderbilt Psychiatric (1) to M.T.M.H.I and (1) to Moccasin Bend in Chattanooga and (1) to Rolling Hills in Franklin.

Miles patrolled for Month of December was 59,876 miles with 4,060 gallons of fuel used at a cost of \$8,710.64 dollars which averages out to be 14.75 miles per gallon per car.

There were 990 warrants served, 104 reports that were written, and 1,423 calls dispatched this month.

Total number of intakes and releases were 360, 260 for the jail, and 75 for the workhouse 25 for juvenile center.

There were a total of 18,293 meals served, 11,780 for the jail at a cost of \$.87 per tray, 5,967 for the workhouse at a cost of \$1.12 per tray, and 546 for the juvenile center at a cost of \$.87 per tray. Total cost for all meals served was \$20,401.96
